Bluff Blvd./Manufacturing Drive Grant

How often do you drive on either Bluff Boulevard or Manufacturing Drive? A few times a week? Every day? Multiple times a day? This stretch of road is one of the busiest in town seeing approximately 10,000-15,000 vehicles per day. This means that everyday nearly half of the people in town use this road. It connects residential portions of town with schools, and commercial districts. Despite its clear importance, not much has changed since it was planned and constructed 100 years ago. Today, the stretch from 7th Ave North to the south has a plethora of issues. In the last 100 years since it was construction Bluff Blvd has gone from being on the western edge of town to now running right down the middle. Auto Traffic has increased over the years, and with its narrow lanes, tight corners and blind intersections have caused this road

to become hazardous. It needs to be made safer.

Traveling along the four mile stretch from Highway 30 to 7th Ave North one would notice a few things: the cross section of the road is constantly changing as it transitions from four lanes to two lanes, then back to four lanes. Some parts have curbs while others only have gravel shoulders. The lanes are uncomfortably narrow, which is apparent when going around bends in the road or next to the exposed bluff. In these instances, the road operates like a three lane road as people avoid the outside lanes. The road also narrows over the bridges. The narrow lanes and tight corners are not conducive to safe driving and over the last 5 years there has been 384 accidents (including some fatalities) many of which could have been avoided.

As you make your way north, you have notice that portions of the road completely lack sidewalks, or the sidewalks have completely failed or are located immediately behind the curbs, putting the pedestrians uncomfortably close to traffic. Like many roads in town, Bluff Boulevard has a number of utilities running beneath it but because of the high traffic volumes and narrow corridor, it is daunting to try to do any work on these utilities. The utilities include gas, water and sewer, many of which are in need of attention. However, despite its significance in our daily commutes, this road has seen very few improvements outside of maintenance projects over the years. But we hope to change that soon.

Campers will need to remain current with their camper fees. The nightly price to camp in our park is \$22/night and fees are due nightly.





BLUFF BLVD /MANUFACTURING DRIVE GRANT
ARTICLE CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1

Over the last year and a half the City of Clinton has been doing research, gathering information, and drafting potential designs in an effort to prepare a thorough application for the Department of Transportation's BUILD Grant Program. Our application would request \$22 million from the US Department of Transportation to assist with the reconstruction of this corridor, which would cost a total \$25 Million. To be a candidate for funding, the project must display eight criteria: safety, state of good repair, economic competitiveness, environmental protection, quality of life, innovation, partnership and project readiness. We feel that this proposed project meets, and in many cases, exceeds the criteria set forth.

If successful in obtaining the grant, the Bluff Boulevard/Manufacturing Drive corridor would receive a complete facelift. The entire stretch would be converted to a consistent width with a minimum of three lanes (a two way left turn lane would be in the middle) with additional turning lanes where necessary. The roadway would be joined by the appropriate pedestrian facilities running

adjacent to the road, with an appropriate setback from the curb. These pedestrian facilities will vary but will include either a recreation trail, a traditional sidewalk or both. Some of the more dangerous intersections will be re-aligned (example: 7th Ave South & Bluff Boulevard and South Bluff & Manufacturing). Additionally there will be new street lighting, new traffic signals, proper pedestrian ramps and the bridges will be raised to avoid flooding as well as to be widened. There will be new construction of new sanitary and storm water facilities the city will be partnering with the gas and water companies to ensure that all utilities are addressed and updated. At this point many of the design and its details have yet to be finalized but rest assured this is a project that will be addressing every facet along the roadway in order to get it exactly right.

Through this project, the corridor will not only be made more pedestrian friendly but it is estimated that accidents will be decreased by up to 50%, making the road safer for vehicles and pedestrians. While some side street intersections will be eliminated, access from side streets will be improved with traditional

perpendicular intersections instead of side streets that connect with Bluff at acute angles. Without this project, the City will still try to make these updates but at a much slower rate over the next 15-20 years. This project will allow the City to address the corridor in a holistic manner, fixing issues many of which have been around since the road was first built.

With the help of the Department of Transportation BUILD Grant and many partnerships, we can successfully reconstruct this road to suit our current needs and the needs of the future. By reducing the excess lanes, widening the driving lanes, providing new pedestrian facilities and updating the utilities, this project will make a significant impact to everybody in our community. A project of this magnitude will not come without issues or frustrations. There will be closed roads, detours, unforeseen problems and delays. But at the end when the project is complete we will have a road tailored for our current and future needs. A road that will safely handle the traffic volume, accommodate pedestrians, and be a project that the entire city can be proud of and benefit from.


ROUNABOUTS

Roundabouts are a growing trend across the United States over the past decade, with the reason being that they are among the safest options available for accident prone intersections.

It has been proven that Roundabouts reduce or eliminate congestion, repair poor geometrics, and ultimately improve intersection safety. It is an unquestioned fact that roundabouts WILL reduce accident rates as well as the injuries caused by these accidents at certain intersections. Modern Roundabouts are safer, more efficient, and less costly than any other intersection design.

These are proven facts, not just rhetoric used by roundabout peddlers eager to construct the next one.

The FHWA Office of Safety has identified roundabouts as a Proven Safety Countermeasure because of their unique ability to reduce the types of crashes where people are seriously hurt or killed by 78-82%, when compared to stop controlled or signalized intersections, based on data available from the Federal Highway Administration. That's right, an average of 80% serious crash reduction! "Why the reduction?" some people may ask. The following chart represents the reduction in conflict points from 32 at a typical intersection to only 8 at a roundabout.

This combined with vehicle speed reduction from 50 mph to 15 mph through the intersection each contribute to the drastic reduction in accident and injuries. Any crashes that do occur in roundabouts tend to be a glancing blow which typically result in an exchange of insurance information rather than a visit by the life flight helicopter.

There are certain intersections in Clinton that would benefit from a roundabout. The most glaring of these are several along Mill Creek Parkway, especially at the intersections of 13th Avenue North and 16th Street Northwest. Roundabouts were

discussed at these intersections in 2016 and 2017 by the City Council, and with no end in sight to the accidents at these intersections, the time has come to have a discussion once again.

The City Engineering Department has recently analyzed traffic accident data throughout the Mill Creek Parkway corridor, and found these two intersections to far exceed the statewide average of 0.7 crashes per million vehicles entering the intersection.

Collision History at 13th Avenue North

From January 1, 2013, through December 31, 2018, the intersection of 13th Avenue North and Mill Creek Parkway had a total of 20 reported crashes. Of the 20 crashes, 13 crashes were caused by failure to yield right-of-way or ran STOP sign. The table below summarizes the reported crashes at the intersection by severity including injuries. The crash rate of the intersection is 1.03 crashes per million entering vehicles.

Collision History at 16th Street Northwest

From January 1, 2013, through December 31, 2018, the intersection of 16th Street NW and Mill Creek Parkway had a total of 34 reported crashes. Of the 34 crashes, 28 crashes were caused by failure to yield right-of-way, improper left turn, or ran STOP sign. The table below summarizes the reported crashes at the intersection by severity including injuries. The crash rate of the intersection is 2.40 crashes per million entering vehicles (MEV).

Crash Conclusions

Without improvements to these intersections, collisions are expected to continue on an increasing trend, due to the expected future development and increased traffic in the area. Roundabouts are the only proven method to improve the safety of these intersections. Construction of roundabouts would drastically reduce the amount of high speed collisions and corresponding injuries resulting from these crashes.

Compelling Roundabout Facts

1. Overall crash reduction of 72% (FHWA)
2. Overall injury reduction of 87% (FHWA)
3. Can be constructed to accommodate large truck traffic
4. Can be constructed to accommodate future growth to four lanes
5. Improves overall intersection delay by eliminating stop signs and red lights
6. Increases awareness and attentiveness of drivers when entering intersections

With roundabouts trending nationwide at a near 100% success rate, it may be time for Clinton to join in on the fun. While not always initially a crowd pleaser, roundabouts will grow on you over time as an experience you sometimes have to drive to believe. You don't have to go very far to find success. The nearby cities of Dubuque, Cedar Rapids, and Prairie Du Chien have recently constructed successful roundabouts.

Conclusions

These projects would include modification of the existing two-way stop control intersection to a single-lane roundabout intersection. Adding traffic signals is not a good option, as it would not have a guaranteed positive effect on the traffic accidents at the intersection, and would actually decrease the overall delay time of the intersection. Roundabouts on Mill Creek Parkway will be much more desirable than a corridor of signals for many reasons, including safety concerns, delay issues, and operation and maintenance costs.

The City of Clinton has not begun design of these projects. The first step would be to gauge public interest and hold public discussion in an open house setting.

Public Input Meetings

The City of Clinton, Clinton Chamber of Commerce, and the Clinton Progress Coalition will be holding quarterly public input meetings for the next 12 months in order to educate residents, concerned citizens, and property owners on the subject of Roundabouts in general. Notices will be published in the Clinton Herald in advance, with the intent that anyone interested attend these meetings.

CLINTON POLICE DEPARTMENT K-9 UNIT

The Clinton Police Department welcomes Ofc. Brennan Roling back after attending a six-week intensive training program at Vohne Liche Kennels in Denver, Indiana. Ofc. Roling returned with his new K-9 partner, Roman, a two-year-old, black, German Shepard, certified in drug detection, apprehension and tracking.

The program commenced with Ofc. Roling and Roman becoming acquainted and bonding with each other prior to beginning training on obedience and tracking. The classes consisted of obedience and obstacle course runs to prepare Roman to listen to commands on and off-leash. Each day the duo participated in exercises tracking people, or articles hidden from sight, in buildings, cars, trailers, open fields, woods, and anywhere a scent was laid down. Tracking assists officers in locating missing children, adults, and criminals.

Ofc. Roling and K-9 Roman trained in apprehending persons. Apprehension training involved simulated burglaries with subjects hiding inside buildings, bailing out of cars, and in open areas. Roman apprehended the bad guy in several searches and multiple scenarios.

K-9 Roman specializes in narcotics detection. Roman is able to detect multiple types of narcotics and drugs. An interesting fact is a dog's nose has an estimated 125 to 225 million receptor cells! In simple words,



humans can smell stew cooking, but Roman can smell each ingredient of the stew! One of the sessions in detection included diversions such as dog food, tennis balls, human food, candy, rubber bands and video tapes wherein Roman detected the odor of narcotics without fail.

Ofc. Roling looks forward to utilizing his and Roman's skills to make our city a safe environment to live, work and visit.

FRAUD

So, this is how it happens . . .

The phone rings and it is a frantic call from someone identifying themselves as your relative; possibly a grandchild, or a friend, and they are in trouble with the police, or have some other emergency. The caller may be crying, acting excited, or intense and tells you they need money to get out of trouble. You, being the caring person you are, try to calm them down and you say their name. Now the person pretending to be your relative has a name and transfers the call to another person who states they are an attorney and can get your relative out of trouble if you follow their directions.

The attorney requests you go to the store and purchase gift cards in a pre-determined amount which may be in the thousands of dollars. The attorney advises you to obtain the cards and they will call you back in an hour. The attorney tells you not to tell anyone, or your relative may be in more trouble.

You quickly get in your car and drive to the local store where you pick up the gift cards in the denominations requested, and drive straight home. When you arrive home, the phone is ringing. It is the attorney who asks you to provide him with the numbers and security code off the back of the cards. You provide him the numbers, and just like that, your hard-earned money is gone and the phone is dead. You have been scammed!

This scam is replayed over and over each day. The story line changes a little and it becomes universal so the thieves bilk money out of individuals and businesses around the world. There are phone banks of people who work to steal your money and they are good at it!

The Federal Trade Commission provides the following tips to avoid fraud:

1. **Spot Imposters.** Do not send money, or give out

personal information in response to an unexpected request – whether it comes as a text, a phone call, or an email.

2. **Do Online Searches.** Use key words like "IRS call." You can even search phone numbers to see if other people have reported them as scams.
3. **Do Not Believe Your Caller ID.** It is easy for scammers to fake caller ID information so the name and number you see are not always real. If someone calls asking for money, or personal information, hang up.
4. **Do Not Pay Up Front for a Promise.** Someone may call and ask you to pay in advance because you won a prize. If you do, they will probably disappear with your money.
5. **Consider How you Pay.** Credit cards have significant fraud protection built in, but some payment methods do not. Wiring money is risky because it is nearly impossible to get your money back. This is also true for reloadable cards and gift cards. Government offices and honest companies will not require you to use these payment methods.
6. **Talk to Someone.** Before you give up your money, or personal information, talk to someone you trust.
7. **Hang up on Robocalls.** If you hear a recorded sales pitch, hang up.
8. **Be Skeptical About Free Trials.** Some companies use free trials to sign you up for products and bill you every month until you cancel. If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.
9. **The IRS will never call you.** They conduct business via United States mail.



INTERNET AND ONLINE SAFETY

Today, people use the internet for many things on a daily basis. Below are some tips the Clinton Police Department would like you to share with your children to help make their use of the internet safer.

Cyber Safety Tips for Kids

- Do not share your password - even with your best friend.
- Know who your friends are! Make sure you know someone in person before you add them to your "friends" list.
- Do not post anything you would not want your grandmother to see.
- What you post online stays online — forever! Think before you post.
- Pay attention to how you are communicating. Do not say anything online you would not say in person. Do not be rude online.
- Protect your privacy and your friend's privacy, too. Obtain their permission before posting something about them.
- Check what your friends are posting, or saying about you. Even if you are careful, they may be putting you at risk.
- Do not take, keep, or send nude, or partial nude, pictures of yourself or others. You could be prosecuted for creating, or distributing child pornography if you possess or send nude, or partial nude, pictures of someone under the age of 18. One teen from Florida was prosecuted and had to register as a sex offender after forwarding a nude picture of his ex-girlfriend to her family and friends.
- Do not hang around online places where people could treat you badly.
- That cute 16-year-old boy may not be so cute, may not be 16, and may not be a boy! You never know!
- Tell a trusted adult if someone does, or says something online which makes you feel uncomfortable.
- Unless you are prepared to attach your Facebook page to your college/job/internship/scholarship, or sports team application, do not post it publicly!
- Do not become an addict. The key to becoming the well-rounded and interesting person you want to be is to find a balance between your online experience and your social encounters.

VEHICLE BURGLARY/ THEFT PREVENTION

Vehicle burglaries are a common crime across the country, and Clinton is no different. Many criminals find vehicles to be an easy target due to poor habits many vehicle owners have. We remind everyone:

LOCK IT - REMOVE IT - OR LOSE IT!

LOCK IT:**KEEP YOUR VEHICLES LOCKED AT ALL TIMES - WHEREVER YOU PARK THEM - AND TAKE YOUR KEYS!**

A very large majority of vehicle burglaries occur through unlocked doors which allow criminals the opportunity to burglarize, or steal them. Criminals look for the easy "score" where they can get in, get what they want, and get out in a matter of seconds, and without making noise, or attracting attention to themselves. Most criminals do not want to break the window because it creates noise and becomes a visual clue to bystanders, walkers or drivers there has been a vehicle burglary which often results in officers called to the area to check things out. When criminals go through an unlocked vehicle, there are no obvious visual clues to bystanders which means there will be no calls to the police department. Remember, criminals want to be discrete and fast. When they come across a locked vehicle, they tend to move on until they find the next unlocked one.

REMOVE IT:

Do not keep anything valuable in your unoccupied car. Criminals "window shop" and observe what you have in your car. The more valuable the item, the more risk the criminal is willing to take to get it. As stated before, criminals are discrete and fast. The ideal car for them to choose for a burglary is unlocked and with valuables inside. They know exactly where to go to get the item and all they have to do is open the door, take what they want, and walk away. It literally takes seconds to become a victim.

Across the country, as well as in Clinton, we have seen an increase in firearms stolen from vehicles. Whether your vehicle is locked or not, **DO NOT STORE FIREARMS IN YOUR VEHICLE!**

Be aware of the opportunities you present to criminals when you leave your garage door opener in your vehicle and your vehicle is parked outside of your house, unlocked. This provides easy access to your home.

Do not keep spare keys to your house, or car in your vehicle. Most vehicle thefts occur because keys are left in the vehicle. **DO NOT LEAVE YOUR KEYS IN YOUR VEHICLE.**

LOSE IT:

While there is no 100% foolproof way to prevent vehicle burglaries, following the tips above reduces your chances of becoming the next victim. You work hard for your possessions; do your best to keep them! Thank you for doing your part to keep our community the safest it can be!

BEARDS FOR CHARITY EVENT

The City of Clinton's goal is to limit the population of deer within the management zone to 20 deer per square mile.

The Clinton Deer Management Committee, along with the Iowa DNR, has developed a deer management plan for the City of Clinton. This year's season will run from September 15, 2019 through January 10, 2020.



The City of Clinton will no longer be issuing incentive tags due to DNR Incentive new rules. Please read all material. There is a large detailed map of the management zone and city property at the Erickson Community Center for your viewing.

You can pick up the application form and return it to the Parks & Recreation Department Office **in person** at the Erickson Community Center, 1401 11th Avenue North, Clinton, Iowa. You must have a photo I.D. that will be photo copied when you submit your application. Applications must be returned before you can take the proficiency test. You do not need to show proof of hunter safety if you participated in last season's hunt.

You will notice that proficiency testing is **required** to obtain a city permit. The testing will take place Sat., Aug. 24, 9-11 a.m. and Sun., Aug. 25, noon-2 p.m. or by appointment by calling 563/243-1260. Testing will take place at the Erickson Community Center (by the pond) – 1401 11th Avenue North – Clinton, IA.

Completion of a "Deer Harvest Report" is required within 24 hours of harvest. Complete a report at Central Fire Station – 344 3rd Avenue South.



ASH TREES IN CLINTON



SO SAD – For our Community!

We, in Clinton, are seeing a sad situation play out right before our eyes. It is the fault of the emerald ash borer beetle which, a few years ago, we saw coming to Iowa and much of the country. We knew what was going to happen and now we see dead and dying ash trees in yards from one end of the city of Clinton to the other!

If an ash tree in your yard looks like either photo the tree is either dead or dying and cannot be saved by any method at this point. Even if you see a few healthy-looking leaves below a sparse or completely dead canopy it is the tree trying mightily to live but next spring it will not have any green on it.

What to do? Unfortunately, dead branches on trees break off very easily in rain storms, ice, and wind and can cause damage to your home or yard or to your neighbor's. The best solution is to have the tree removed before that happens. Tree removal should be left to the professionals who have the right equipment and knowledge to take the tree down safely. We can't change this sad situation but we can arrange for safe tree removal even if there are some green leaves left. Please consider planting a new tree for beauty, to provide shade, and to bring life back to your yard and neighborhood.

Recently our Parks & Recreation Department installed 4 new playground systems in various Parks.




Clinton Park received new swings, and climber and a drinking fountain.



Chancy Park received an entirely new system featuring 2 slides, swings, climbing stations, hanging bars and more. This system is a must see!







The wonders of reading don't stop when you've matured out of school. We here at Clinton Public Library support life-long learning and have made it our mission (literally — this is part of our mission statement!) to continue to grow. For this reason, we felt it imperative to provide the adults of Clinton an opportunity to participate in our Summer Reading Program! So, adult patrons — have no fear! We've got you covered.

Adults could find a copy of the reading log on the main floor. The Reading log for our adult patrons was a BINGO sheet this year with a free spot in the middle, this was designed to parallel a typical bingo sheet, but hopefully it was more entertaining and transformed what genres of books one might want to read. Or even, in some cases, where one physically read! Patrons who finished a bingo were able to win a small prize and entered into a drawing for a prize gift basket! Thank you for taking a walk on the wild side or perhaps to even a different land and for joining us in celebrating a Universe of Stories.

A UNIVERSE OF STORIES

This year's Summer Reading Program was filled with stories. Stories children read, stories children wrote, stories children created art from, and stories kids starting telling themselves about what they could be when they grow up: a programmer, a computer scientist, or a robotics engineer.

Summer is a crucial time for learners, and the Summer Reading Program is an important way to avoid the "summer slump," learning loss that comes from less time spent on educational activities like reading, math, and problem solving. With the Summer Reading Program, kids are motivated to keep reading throughout the summer which helps them retain, and often improve, their reading skills so that they are ready for a successful start to school in the fall. We are happy to say we had 300 readers sign up for Summer Reading this year!

However, the Children's Department is committed to providing kids with a variety of learning opportunities and experiences that also encompass math, science, creative thinking, and art. We are proud to announce that this summer we offered four camps: a Swarmbots Camp in the makeLab where kids hacked into RC cars to create a mesh network of synchronized bots, two Art Camps where littles learned about different art styles based off of children's books, and finally we ran the 2nd Clinton Young Authors Writing Camp where 18 young authors wrote books that will be published and become part of our library collection in the fall. All in all, over 45 Clinton kids participated in our summer camp offerings, and it is our hope that this number will continue to grow.

These camps, and the Summer Reading Program as a whole, would not be possible were it not for the generous donations from our local sponsors. I would like to thank Buffalo Wild Wings, Pizza Hut, Carol's Original Dairy Treat, Dairy Queen, and the Sawmill Museum for providing prizes for our kids this year. I would also like to give a special thanks to the Friends of the Library, NelsonCorp Wealth Management, Billion Toyota of Clinton, and DuTrac Community Credit Union whose financial contributions helped fund our camps and performers.

Life is the story that we tell ourselves. And, this summer we wanted to offer kids "A Universe of Stories" to choose from about who they are, where they live, and who they can grow up to be.

The General Fund is the main operating fund for the City. The Road Use Tax Fund is an example of a special revenue fund. Special Rev Funds are earmarked for and restricted for specified purposes. The TIF = Tax Increment Financing is utilized by many local governments for redevelopment and improvement projects on existing structures. The debt service fund is established to service interest & principal payments on debt. Capital projects funds consist of various types of financial resources utilized in the acquiring or constructing of capital facilities or assets. Proprietary funds are used to account for services delivered in a manner similar to private industry. Sewer & Solid Waste are examples.




THE CITY OF CLINTON
STREET & SOLID WASTE DEPARTMENT

INTRODUCTION: The City of Clinton Street Department is responsible for several items within the city's right-of-ways. Some of these responsibilities include: pothole repairs; putting up and replacing street signage; street sweeping; snow & ice removal on city streets; alley grading; right-of-way mowing and weed spraying; and removing fallen trees, branches, and debris within the roadway.

The City of Clinton Solid Waste Department is responsible for the collection of

the majority of the city-owned garbage, yard waste and recycling carts. We are also responsible for taking the orders for delivery and cancellation of the city-owned carts.

The Street and Solid Waste Department strive to maintain the safety and health of our community in all our endeavors.

As a reminder when driving around town, we ask that you please use caution and slow down when approaching street crews in the roadway! Thank you!

City Ordinance Regarding Placing Debris in Street or Alley

§ 97.003 PLACING DEBRIS ON

It is unlawful for any person to throw or deposit on any street or alley any glass, glass bottle, nails, tacks, wire, cans, trash, garbage, rubbish, litter, offal, leaves, grass or any other debris likely to be washed into the storm sewer and clog the storm sewer, or any substance likely to injure any person, animal or vehicle.

(Iowa Code §321.369) (1999 Code §135.03) Penalty, see § 10.99

City Ordinance Regarding Tree Responsibility

§ 98.06 DUTY TO TRIM TREES

The owner or agent of the abutting property shall keep the trees in or overhanging the street trimmed so that all branches will be at least 13 feet above the surface of the street and nine feet above the sidewalks. If the abutting property owner fails to trim the trees, the city may serve notice on the abutting property owner requiring that such action be taken within five days. If such action is not taken within that time, the city may perform the required action and assess the costs against the abutting property for collection in the same manner as a property tax. Except as allowed in this section, it is unlawful for any person to trim or cut any tree in a street or public place without first obtaining authorization from the city. The Building and Neighborhood Services Official or his or her designee shall have the power to enforce this section.

(Iowa Code §§ 364.12(2)(c), 364.12(2)(d), 364.12(2)(e), 364.12(3)(b)) (Ord. 2437, passed 12-14-2010) Penalty, see § 98.99

Please be aware that tarps and/or covers are required by City Ordinance on any and all waste being transported to the Clinton County Solid Waste Agency (aka the Landfill).

§ 50.27 LOADING

Vehicles or containers used for the collection and transportation of any solid waste shall be **loaded** and moved in a manner that the contents will not fall, leak or spill therefrom, and shall be covered to prevent blowing or loss of material. Where spillage does occur, the material shall be picked up immediately by the collector or transporter and returned to the vehicle or container and the area properly cleaned.

SOLID WASTE COLLECTION PROGRAM

CART INFORMATION

- All City of Clinton collection carts are the property of the City.
- The City has 3 types of collection carts:
- Grey – garbage, Green – yard waste, and Blue – recycling.
- Collection carts are assigned to an address, not an individual (family). When ownership of a residence changes, each cart must stay at the address it is assigned to. Residents may cancel services at any time and all appropriate carts will be removed.
- Each resident is responsible for the proper care and security of the collection carts. The resident will be charged for replacing a cart should it become damaged or stolen as the result of improper care and/or not keeping the cart secured on the property.

COLLECTION INFORMATION

- All carts must be out by 7:00 am the day of collection.
- Garbage should be bagged in the grey cart.
- Yard waste should be placed loose in the green cart (no bags).
- Recycling should be placed loose in the blue cart (no bags).
- Carts will not be emptied if there is improper or incorrect material in the cart (such as garbage in a yard waste or recycling cart).
- Hot ashes should never be placed in the carts.
- Construction debris is not allowed in any of the carts.
- Toxic or hazardous waste is not allowed in any of the carts. This includes: electronics, pesticides, paint cans with paint, motor oils, sharps containers, flammable material, etc. (Contact the Clinton County Landfill at 563-243-4749 for any questions about acceptable material).
- The maximum weight limit of the 95-gallon carts is 200 lbs.
- To avoid exceeding the weight limitation of the cart, or causing possible damage to the cart or collection vehicle, do not place rocks, concrete, bricks or dirt inside carts. Any items placed within the cart must fall out easily when the cart is being serviced. Please do not overfill or tightly pack items into the cart.
- Lids must be closed.
- Give adequate space between carts for collection by the automated trucks – 3 feet apart is optimal.
- Carts must be placed for collection away from homes, garages, fences, parked vehicles, utility poles, mailboxes, etc.
- Carts should not be placed higher than 1 foot above the surface that the collection truck is on.
- Carts should not be left at their collection spots past the collection day. Carts should be removed from the street or alley right-of-way and placed in a designated storage area on the resident's property. (This will prevent a possible road hazard, damage to the cart, or theft of the cart).


