Public Works: Streets and Solid Waste

Increased Recycling by 452 tons (904,000 Pounds) and decreased Solid Waste by 324 tons (648,000 pounds) in first full year

\$35,000 savings just from tipping fees being removed for SW decrease and tons of recycling increase that may have ended up as SW. Plus allows the CCASWA cells to last longer (drops expenses).

Which the CCASWA is open for business...The City of Clinton provided the first load of Recycling (3/4/2019) photo - which is also historical change that we were part of with CCASWA – that removed the “head tax” and has the County with a lower levy amount which also resulted in cost savings for SW and Recycling.

- **Matterport Camera System:**

- This system is a tool that is becoming much more common in the quest to document and preserve evidence in its context using a 3D scanner. Much of crime scene work is identifying, documenting, and collecting evidence. Evidence is not always a physical object or property that may be documented and collected. The absence of something can be powerful evidence. It is one thing to objectively collect vast amounts of data on a scene, but altogether different when it comes to such things as accuracy, speed, and volume. This camera was co-purchased by the Clinton Police Department and the Clinton Fire Department.

- The Arlo Go Mobile Security Camera is ideal for security monitoring when in areas with limited or no WiFi access. Arlo Go works wherever there is 3G/4G LTE wireless connections. 



- Code Enforcement has been concentrating on dangerous homes for demo







Over the past several years, the City of Clinton Engineering Department has been using Deighton's Total Infrastructure Management System (dTIMS) asset management software to track citywide pavement condition index (City PCI). This information has been used to prioritize the street rehabilitation schedule and budget for street construction from 2013 to 2022. The plan includes budgetary cost estimates based on expected quantities, known ADA accessibility issues, and contingency factors. Above is a chart of actual changes in the Citywide Pavement Condition Index from 2007 to 2017.





Clinton MTA provides bus service to Clinton and surrounding areas. Buses meet every half hour for the hour and half hour at the Central Transfer Point located at 6th Ave. S. and 2nd St. in downtown Clinton. The Lincolnway Shuttle meets at 10 minutes after and 20 minutes before the hour. MTA bus routes serve all schools and commercial-industrial centers within the City of Clinton. All services are open to the general public.

Guide to the bus for first time riders:

The MTA will provide a travel trainer for first time bus riders at their request. Properly controlled caged or service animals accompanying persons with disabilities are allowed on the bus. Oxygen carts are allowed.

How to ride the bus

Find your location on the route map and choose the nearest colored route to your location. Turn the map over to see the time schedule when a color-coded to the route. There are several checkpoints along the route that show the schedule times that the bus will be in that area. Arrive at least 5 minutes earlier than the scheduled pickup time. Please have your fare or pass ready before boarding the bus. Children under 5 years old must be secured by a child seat and have an adult lap and shoulder folded up under the seat.

Ring the stop request signal approximately three blocks before the stop. Please keep your feet off the curb when you stop. Please keep the bus stop clean when you depart from the bus. Remember city buses cannot stop traffic. Please wait until the bus departs before you cross the street. Please observe the priority seating in the front of the bus that is reserved for the elderly and disabled passengers. Please allow the bus driver to concentrate on driving the bus. Kindness and courtesy is a minimum and avoid unnecessary distractions.

Passengers are not allowed to ride continuously around town. Please pay your fare or pass before you get on the bus. Please pay additional fares. Ride to your destination and depart at that location. All passengers must wear shirts and shoes. Riders wearing shorts or tank tops cannot be worn on the bus.

Waiting for the MTA bus

Please wait on the right hand side of the street on the corner of the street and the bus stop. Please be patient and arrive at the bus stop location about 5 minutes before the scheduled time. All buses have an atomic clock on board as the driver uses the atomic clock to determine the time. Please use an atomic clock for the correct time. Make sure that you wait where a driver can see you as the bus approaches. Signal to let the driver know you are waiting. Please be patient and waving at the driver. You must be at a signed bus stop or on the right hand side of the street at a corner before the intersection. Thank you for riding with us!
